We can stop the cuts

Local protest and meeting reports

1,200 in Nottingham

ROUND 1,200 protesters marched through Nottingham on Saturday 20 November to a town centre rally organised by Notts Save Our Services (SOS).

This was the largest protest in Nottingham for many years and was led by pupils, staff and parents from Gedling school which is faced with closure as a result of cuts.

Local trade unions were represented with banners from the GMB, Ucatt and Unison as well as the NUT, along with an array of homemade banners.

The speakers showed their determination to fight the cuts all the way, and to oppose all cuts in services.

Local government worker and Unison member Jean Thorpe said: "We do not accept the Tory dogma that says that our jobs, our services and our benefits have to pay for their crisis. It's economic madness that will increase unemployment by 1.5 million.

"It's also ideological - the Tories want to shrink the state, hand over the rich pickings in health, education and so on to their friends in the private sector to boost their profits."

"But it's also Tory ideology to divide, to make us less effective in fighting the cuts, with comments like 'claiming benefits is a lifestyle choice' or 'public sector workers are on gold plated pay and pensions' and we must not let them divide us in this way."

Socialist Party members sold 93 copies of The Socialist paper and raised over £50 that will help with the production of more anti-cuts material including leaflets and posters.

The SOS group meets every Monday and will be present at the protest at Gedling school on 25 November.

'No Lewisham cuts!'

NEW LABOUR Mayor for Lewisham Steve Bullock faced angry protestors and chants of "no ifs, no buts, no Lewisham cuts" as he met with his handpicked cabinet to agree the first phase of cuts to local services on 17 November.

A lobby, organised by Lewisham Anti-Cuts Alliance (LACA), of 200 people heard speakers from local public sector unions, anti-academies campaigns and college students fighting against EMA cuts.

Martin Powell-Davies, NUT branch secretary and one of the organisers of LACA described the threat to public services that Labour's cuts posed and warned that the council's 'phase two' cuts next year were to go even deeper.

We heard days before the meeting that the council had been forced to delay a decision on the closure of five libraries after community campaigns mobilised against the council.

Inside the meeting Bullock faced constant heckling and chanting and the meeting was adjourned for 40 minutes. The cabinet waved through the cuts, which included the closure of the 'Opening Doors' service to help unemployed people back to work.

The proposals go to a meeting of the full council on Monday 29 November where LACA and the Socialist Party will be calling for councillors to refuse to make the cuts and instead unite with the local community in fighting for decent services and jobs in the borough.

150 at Portsmouth launch

OVER 150 trade unionists, students and community activists packed into a university lecture theatre on 18 November to officially launch the Portsmouth anti-cuts campaign.

The meeting, hosted by Portsmouth trades council, sought to use the momentum generated by recent local anti-cuts marches and public meetings to build a community wide campaign prepared to take on every single proposed cut.

The first speaker, Laurie Heselden from the Trades Union Congre read out the cuts which the public sector will be facing, before outlining the limited TUC strategy of training union reps, lobbying local politicians and building for a national demonstration in March.

In contrast, Ben Norman from Youth Fight for Jobs South proposed that the campaign should back the call for a national trade union demonstration sooner than March, a proposal greeted by the first round of applause of the evening.

Ben also called for the campaign to be committed to fighting all cuts and proposed standing anti-cuts candidates in the upcoming local elections

Contributions from the floor included discussion on the need to link to regional anti-cuts campaigns, and accounts of the NUS demo by students from Portsmouth University.

The meeting also elected a steering committee that includes trade union reps, students' union officers, school students from the Portsmouth Save Our Schools campaign and delegates from the Pensioners The campaign will next meet on

Monday 29 November.

Doncaster demo

AROUND 200 people attended a Doncaster demonstration against the cuts on 13 November.

The demonstration tapped into the growing anger against the Con-Dem government and the local Labour council that will administer the cuts in Doncaster.

Doncaster council has already issued 91 redundancy notices to front line staff in children's services. Yet in Doncaster there have been seven children killed who were on the 'at risk' register and under the 'watchful eye' of Doncaster social services.

The main reason given for the very poor service these vulnerable children received was the lack of experienced staff and heavy workloads. 91 less workers will certainly not improve this.
