A hundred people cram into Socialist Party public meeting

Up to 100 people, including Socialist Party members, former members, young workers and retired workers, crammed into the Merseyside Socialist Party public meeting on 5 July. This made a fitting tribute on the 20th anniversary of Liverpool Militant MP Terry Fields being jailed for refusing to pay his poll tax.

The poll tax was prime minister Thatcher's flagship policy, which meant every adult, rich or poor, was charged the same local government

In a campaign led by Militant, the predecessor of the Socialist Party, 18 million people refused to pay, forcing Thatcher to resign and the tax to be abandoned.


PCS union president Janice Godrich (personal capacity) nailed the myth cultivated by the Con-Dems and media, repeated many times by Labour leader Ed Miliband, that "negotiations" on public sector pensions are actually taking place between the trade unions and the government. There is no real negotiation, just a Con-Dem blueprint for savaging workers' retirement.

Alec Price, on behalf of Youth Fight for Jobs, described the all-fronts assault on young people by the Con-Dems. Alec will be taking part in the 2011 Jarrow-London march.

Tony Mulhearn, a leader of Liverpool council's battle against cuts in the 1980s, spoke next. No number of attacks on the record of the 1983-87 council, which refused to make cuts and won £60 million of extra funding from the then Tory government, can obscure the fact that we need that kind of struggle now. A new mass party of the working class is essential

Peter Taaffe, Socialist Party general secretary, welcomed the meeting as the first such event of this size for many years on Merseyside. Peter said we should go forward with confidence in the battle against cuts.

Inspired by the speakers and our ideas, £360 was donated to the collection and numerous copies of the Socialist paper were sold. Several people agreed to join the Socialist Party, with many more expressing interest in joining.
