'Not Guilty': Support for Occupy Cardiff activists

On 11 November six Occupy Cardiff activists were arrested by South Wales police, simply for exercising their right to protest peacefully. Two activists, Jason and Eric, were charged and brought to Cardiff magistrate's court on 28 November.

Occupiers left their new camp outside Transport House, Welsh headquarters of Unite the Union, to show support for Jason and Eric outside the court.

Almost as soon as the "Defend the Right to Protest: Occupy Cardiff" banner was unravelled, support was given from passers-by and beeping

Jason then led chants of: "What

want it? Now!"

In a great show of solidarity, activists from Occupy Bristol also made the journey to Cardiff.

After about 45 minutes of energetic protest, the court was ready to start and allowed around 25 activists to 'Occupy' its seats.

Proceedings lasted a mere five minutes. Both Jason and Eric pleaded not guilty to the charge of breaking the public order act. The trial was adjourned to 8 February. Eric was given unconditional bail and Jason received bail on the condition that he did not go near Cardiff Castle, the original Occupy Cardiff site.

Cardiff city council should have supported their right to peaceful protest instead of wasting money on the trial. The council used a 136 year old by-law to withdraw the right of

mood to fight 'daylight robbery'

A Leeds Against the Cuts public meeting during the build-up to the 30 November strike action saw a resolute and defiant mood as people agreed the government's plans were a daylight robbery of pensions.

But discussion around 30 November was not just about pensions, but also about opposing all cuts. In showing solidarity with the Jarrow March 2011 (see pages 6 and 7), chair Laura Miles highlighted the real threat the government is posing to our livelihoods and welfare in its attacks on the public sector.

CWU speaker Ryan Chase stated he would not be alive without the NHS. Jarrow marcher Stephanie Maston explained how this retirement age increase, coupled with cuts on education, was placing serious roadblocks in front of her in becoming a physics teacher.

Some workers worry about the effects of losing pay if they go on strike. But a CWU representative belted from the audience that the government would take "one day's pay off your salary every month" in pension cuts and that "the services that our parents and grandparents fought for
